

MARY AIKENHEAD

WHEN Archbishop Murray proposed to Mary Aikenhead that she should join him in founding a congregation of nuns, the cause of charity received a notable recruit.

Mary was the daughter of a Protestant doctor in Cork who had married a Catholic and she was brought up in her father's religion. The doctor, however, became a Catholic on his death-bed and Mary's conversion followed soon afterwards.

The first convent of the Irish Sisters of Charity was opened in North William Street, Dublin, and Mary Aikenhead was appointed Superior-General of the new foundation. Although a semi-invalid for many years before her death she lived to see the establishment of ten houses belonging to her Order.

Her most notable memorial, perhaps, is St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin, which was the first hospital in Ireland to be served by nuns. She died on July 22, 1858.
